This acknowledges the fact that this camp is potentially dangerous. We have kids in our neighborhood too—why is it preferable in your minds to expose THEM to danger?

I don't accept the argument that the camp will be safe and well run by SAVS. I don't think Adrienne Lauby is up to the task of managing this project. Turning it over to her is inviting disaster.

At one point in our conversation I asked Diana what I could say to convince her to vote no on this plan December 7th. She said, "What are the options? Are you suggesting we do nothing?" But, I didn't say do nothing. I said, "Don't do <u>THIS</u>".

I volunteer at the Center for Spiritual Living in Santa Rosa and every Sunday I hear their mission statement, "To create a world that works for everyone". Diana infers that a bad plan is better than no plan. But, I would say that a good plan is always better than a bad plan. Take some time, think about it some more, then come up with a good plan that works for everyone.
