Dear Sebastopol City Council and Staff,

I support an OPT-IN policy to a digital meter for customers who want detailed water usage data. A pay to opt-out policy is punitive, discriminatory, and ignores Sebastopol's General Plan that calls for community wide opt out of smart meters: "Action CHW 4h: Support efforts to approach and encourage the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to allow the City to opt out of public utility wireless data transmission systems (such as smart meters)."

Sebastopol banned smart meters in 2013, for "matters of public health, safety and consumer protection..."

Sebastopol's Telecommunications Ordinance 1123 requires public notice and a planning commission review.

Sebastopol's General Plan Community Health and Wellness Goals are to minimize unsafe EMF's.

the Zero Waste Sonoma purchasing policy calls for purchasing products that minimize environmental impacts, toxins, pollution and hazards to worker and community safety, as well as to purchase durable and long lasting products. (If a smart water meter battery fails, the whole unit has to be replaced.)

Peer reviewed published studies show EMF radiation threatens nature and causes a wide range of health impacts: "Effects include increased cancer risk, cellular stress, increase in harmful free radicals, genetic damages, structural and functional changes of the reproductive system, learning and memory deficits, neurological disorders, and negative impacts on general well-being in
